
## **Paul Harris Society**

After high school, she graduated from the Center for Information Dominance, earning the highest recognition as top graduate before serving six years as a Cryptologic Analyst for Naval Intelligence. She supported military, counter-narcotics and search and rescue operations in Florida, Spain, Canada, and Washington D.C. In addition, she served twice in combat in both Iraq and Yugoslavia.

During the years that followed, she faced seemingly insurmountable health challenges. Resolved to fight for her own future, she began building hope for herself and others. The crux of her journey began by asking 'The Right Question'.

Amanda completed her B.S. in Community Health at the University of Illinois in Urbana-Champaign earning the highest University honors: the Bronze Tablet. She completed her Masters in Public Health in Health Promotion and Behavioral Science from San Diego State University and was recognized as the 'Top Graduate Student' within the College of Health and Human Services.



She is a nationally renowned speaker and performer who continues to share her story of hope, inspiring others to 'Ask The Right Question'; her outreach to the world continues to be her greatest passion. She also works as a research scientist, consultant, and is scheduled to release her first book in the fall of 2015.

## India – Jordan Ingersoll

This past August I was granted the opportunity to travel abroad to India for a two week experience with a grant from the Kearney Dawn Rotary Club. My destination was Bangalore India, where I stayed with several Rotary host families. My first day was



a cultural explosion of new sights, smells, and tastes, among many other experiences. Notably, I remember being awestruck by the sheer volume of people, all navigating within the confined roads and walkways. I also appreciated the many forms of architecture I was able to witness each day, different than anything I had ever viewed before. This was especially evident from the many different temples I was able to visit. Addi-

tionally, the food itself was a highlight of the trip, as my host family either prepared

home cooked meals or took me out to enjoy other native cuisines. I enjoyed the many kinds of curry and tropical fruit not available at the local grocery stores in Nebraska. However, among everything I experienced, the thing that impressed me most was the appreciation individuals showed each other in Bangalore. With so many cultural backgrounds, it was amazing to see how much respect each person shows to one another.

Yet, it isn't just that those living in India respect one another; they take it a step further and get involved with bettering their community and the lives of others. Primarily, the Bangalore Rotary Clubs (all 60 of them) seek



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to tackle the largest problems present in their area. I had the opportunity to travel around the city and see firsthand some of the projects the clubs worked on. I visited a Hospice for those with terminal cases of cancer, where their stay was free of charge and each individual was passionately cared for. Also, I accompanied Rotarians to a musical play put on by children from both a school for Autistic children and an orphanage, each funded by Rotary clubs. Upon returning to Nebraska, I have felt inspired to go out and give back to my community. I chose to get involved with the newly founded UNK Rotaract club, with hopes of providing others an opportunity to participate in service too. I feel blessed and thankful to have been given such an amazing chance to witness a culture so unique and different from my own.



## RECORDS SET AT ROTARY SPONSORED BLOOD DRIVES

"RECORDS ARE MADE TO BE BROKEN". This adage is obvious at this time of year with all the sporting events going on.

But what about Rotary sponsored blood drives? Jeanie Cozad, coordinator for the Rotary sponsored blood drives in Valentine states in her blood drive report of September 4, 2014, "WOW!!! 100 units has got to be a record. We have had some in the 90's but to the best of my recollection, none hit 100."

Then there is the Rotary sponsored blood drive on November 6, 2014. Jeanie reports, "Records are made to be broken, and we broke 2 records on Nov. 6<sup>th</sup> ..... 105 units were collected. That is the most ever collected for the Valentine Community". But wait, there is more. Jeanie reports further, "The second record set is for the North Platte Red Cross in their collections. No other site that they visit has ever collected 16 Double Reds which is the number collected."

The Rotary sponsored blood drives in Valentine began on January 16, 2003 and since that time the Valentine Rotary Club has sponsored 69 blood drives with 5,220 units of blood collected. The next Rotary sponsored blood drive in Valentine is scheduled for January 8.

Since 1970, January has been designated as National Blood Donor month. With this in mind, January would be a great time for Rotary clubs in District 5630 to step forward to sponsor their own blood drives. It is a great way to keep members active in an ongoing club project as well being in the business of saving lives, SERVICE ABOVE SELF.

## World Polio Update



#### 2015 Records First Polio Case in Pakistan

Pakistan's first polio case in 2015 was reported January 1st in a two-year-old child. The polio virus was found in the child who lives in an area that lies close



to the Pakistan-Afghan border in restive Balochistan province.

The 2014 was the toughest year for the Pakistan anti-polio program as the number of confirmed cases rose to 296, the highest in the country for the last fifteen years. During the past six months, Pakistan has topped the world polio cases, recording 85 per cent of all the polio cases reported around the world.

Lack of security is the main reason for the spread of polio virus as vaccination cannot be easily organized in tribal areas

where Taliban still control large areas. Militants have killed at least 64 health workers and their escorts. They consider polio medicine as a conspiracy by the West to sterile Muslims.

The need for better success in vaccination strategy has prompted testing a new idea called "Justice for Health" which combines Rotaryprovided polio vaccine with other government health delivery measures. Justice for Health offers not just the polio vaccine but a "sanitation bucket" containing water




purifying pills, bars of soap and clean towels. Households are also given general health information, and vouchers for other, popular, vaccines, such as measles and diphtheria. Justice for Health is a health campaign, not a polio campaign. And each vaccination round lasts just one day, so opponents do not have time to mobilize.

#### 2015 Raises Hopes for Polio-Free Africa

The recent success in Nigeria raises hopes for a polio free African continent and ultimately for success in the rest of the world. Nigeria has recorded only six polio cases for the entire year and these were restricted to a small region. Since July 24, 2014 there have been no polio cases in Nigeria.



In January, 2015, Nigeria will qualify for preliminary certification as polio free having gone six months without any new polio cases. This is a remarkable achievement considering that polio cases were on the rise in Nigeria only three years ago.

#### World Polio Cases down about 6% in 2014.

In 2013 there were large polio outbreaks the spread of 225 cases to nonendemic countries. In 2014 this number was cut to less than a 10<sup>th</sup> of the previous year with only 19 cases in non-endemic countries (as of Dec 24<sup>th</sup>). While increased cases have hit Pakistan, the world-wide number of total polio cases is down from 2013. Final numbers are still not in, but it appears that 2014 will end with about 94% of the total from 2013.

Rotary's ongoing efforts to provide vaccine have never been more important than now. There is every potential that polio could again spread from Pakistan and therefore vaccinations must be continued to protect from possible spread.

Syria represents a very risky situation. Previously Syria was polio free and had over 95% vaccination rates. Now, half the Syrian population is displaced by war and public health efforts have been totally disrupted with hundreds of thousands of children now unvaccinated.

All clubs are urged to consider how to produce additional funding for Polio Plus as we enter the last half of our Rotary Year.

#### **Mercy Meals Packoff**



On Monday, December 8, the Lions Club and Rotary Club of Imperial met at Mercy Meals in Wauneta for a "Pack-Off" to see which club's representatives could pack the most meals in two hours. At the end of the evening, the Rotary Club side (with the help of a Lion and other volunteers) had packed 4800 meals, 300 more than the Lion Club side's 4500 meals, for a total of 9300 packages. That's enough for 57,600 servings for citizens of Ukraine who are in need of a nutritious meal.

#### **Two New Members and Paul Harris Fellow Inducted**

On Tuesday, December 9, during their annual Christmas party, Imperial Rotary Club president Tom Gaschler inducted two new members. Brianna Pribbeno and Kate Davis are both residents of Imperial and are anxious to be used in community service. 




Arnold Rotary was a 100 percent Paul Harris Fellow Club in 2008. The club achieved that status again last Thursday night, when five of the members were awarded their Paul Harris Fellow pins. Kelli Blevins, Amanda Koubek, Todd Thompson, Holly Hornung-Remund and Arnold businessman Brad Atkins were all awarded their first PH pin. Melody received what is called PH +2. Sunya Peters and Debby Moninger will be awarded their Paul Harris pins at a later date.

Paul Harris began a law practice in Chicago in 1896 and in 1905, organized the first Rotary Club with only three members, establishing a goal of "fellowship and friendship." He realized early on that the club should initiate a "service" project and so they were responsible for the construction of public toilets in Chicago, thus transforming their Rotary club into the first "service club." By the time of his death at the age of 79, there were over 200,000 members in 75 countries. Rotary has grown to the largest service club in the world. Starting in the 1937-38 Rotary year, individuals who had contributed more than \$1000 to the ro-

tary foundation were recognized as Paul Harris Fellows. This recognition is not limited to Rotarians.

Karen Hough was awarded the first "Friend of Rotary" award during the evening also. Karen tirelessly helps with any Rotary service project that she can. She can be seen serving at the annual Pancake Feed or serving for at the 4th of July barbecue.

"She is always a phone call away and willing to help on any of our projects." said President Berni Crow. "This was our way of saying 'Thank you Karen for a job well done.'"
