Efforts in Nepal

Dear Rotarians,

We express our profound sadness and extend our sympathies to all those affected by the devastation resulting from the 25 April deadly earthquake in Nepal. Rescue missions and emergency aid continue to arrive in Nepal for the 8 million people impacted by the massive 7.8 magnitude quake.

As we mourn the thousands of lost lives, Rotary joins many international agencies in providing immediate relief to survivors and mobilizing our expertise to support long-term recovery and rebuilding efforts.

How to help:

- District 3292, Nepal, has established a disaster relief fund to provide needed equipment and supplies to affected communities. Contact District Governor Kumar Piya for information about contributing to the fund.
- Rotary's service partner ShelterBox is working closely with Nepali Rotarians to coordinate immediate relief efforts. On Monday, 27 April, and Wednesday, 29 April,

Rotarians greeted ShelterBox response teams in Nepal who will mobilize temporary housing and relief efforts. An initial 1,000 housing tents and 1,000 shelter kits will be distributed throughout affected communities. Two more ShelterBox relief teams and additional kits are ready to be deployed once further assessments are complete. Learn more about supporting ShelterBox's relief efforts.

- As with all disasters, the Rotary family may apply for global grants to support long-term recovery efforts in Nepal. Once immediate health, safety, and relief efforts have been addressed, work with local Nepali Rotary members and their international partners to develop projects within Rotary's six areas of focus.

DISTRICT GRANT APPLICATION DEADLINE: FRIDAY MAY 15th

The application deadline for District Grants is Friday, May 15th. Grant applications MUST be completed on MatchingGrants.org before midnight May 15. If you are going to request District Designated Funds for the Rotary year 2015-16 for a District Grant, you must have completed the following qualification steps.

2015-2016 QUALIFICATIONS FOR CLUBS

Qualifications for club eligibility include - Meet the following district requirements:

- Club must have filed an IRS Form 990 for the year 2014 and upload a copy attached to each grant application on MatchingGrants.org.
- Club President and President Elect MUST both agree to the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) on the District website, sign and upload a copy attached to each grant request on MatchingGrants.org.
- Attendance at Rotary Foundation Grant Management seminar, or made other arrangements for individual training with DRFC.
- Club MUST have made some cash contribution to the Rotary Foundation Annual Fund before May 15, 2015.
- District Grant from 2014-2015, must have a status of "Completed", all documentation uploaded and Final report filed to MatchingGrants.org website.
- Comply with Grant Terms and Conditions
 - Agree to record keeping of expenses and receipt retention requirements
 - Proper grant oversight with committee of three club members
 - Bank account solely for Rotary Foundation Global Grant funds
 - Ensure funds used only for qualified expenses

POLIO: ALL EYES ON PAKISTAN

Now that we are one third through the year 2015, the numbers speak clearly. In Pakistan this year there have already been 22 new cases of polio. In all the rest of the world combined there has been only one other polio case in the area of Afghanistan bordering Pakistan. During the same period in 2014 there 68 new cases of polio in the entire world. Thus, 2015 is starting with approximately one-third of the numbers seen in the previous year and now 95% of all the polio cases in the world are in Pakistan.

This is encouraging because the reduced number of countries reporting new polio cases (only two) is now lower than at any other time in recorded history. The reduced number of new cases is also encouraging because 2014 was a year of significant set-backs with a marked increase in polio cases affecting Pakistan. The rest of the world is becoming polio-free and there is a real risk that polio could be re-introduced.



Nigeria is getting closer to being declared "polio free" with the last wild type polio cases recorded in July 2014. In fact, the entire continent of Africa is experiencing something never before seen: No new polio cases in over seven months! The most recent case in Africa was in August, 2014 in Somalia.

Now Pakistan is where all eyes are focused in the polio eradication effort. Pakistan is the only country in the world that is exporting polio virus to other countries. Unlike smallpox with obvious visible signs of disease, polio virus can be carried by people who appear to be well. This has prompted the World Health Organization (WHO) to extend travel restrictions to people from Pakistan with a requirement for a certificate of polio vaccination

for anyone leaving the country.

The biggest challenge in Pakistan is mistrust of polio vaccinations. The trend of parents refusing to immunize their children increased dramatically after it was publicized that the CIA had carried out a fake hepatitis immunization drive to pinpoint Osama bin Laden's compound. The Taliban has violently opposed polio vaccination and carried out assassinations of polio vaccination workers. Since 2012, 76 workers have been killed, targeted in security risk areas and some provincial capitals. The Pakistan government provides armed police security to polio workers. Public gatherings and sitting on the seat behind the driver of a motorcycle, moped or bicycle are banned in major cities during vaccinations.

A huge oral vaccination campaign by the government in March reached 33.6 million children, or 79 percent of the 34.7 million targeted. Despite the stepped-up vaccination campaign, however, 358,165 children were listed as "unavailable" and 33,695 missed the vaccine because of parental refusal. Many refuse on religious grounds, and some believe vaccination campaigns are a form of birth control or are designed to weaken fertility. In tribal areas, families often refuse immunization because they fear Taliban retribution. A National Islamic Advisory Group has been formed to work with local level religious leaders especially in high risk areas to minimize refusals and cover missed children.

ROTARY'S ROLE IN PAKISTAN

With so many government personnel involved in polio vaccination in Pakistan, what is the role of Rotary, International? Pakistan's Rotary Clubs do participate in immunizations, but typically in the more secure areas of the country. Rotary also supplies the actual vaccine being used by the government vaccinators and the temperature controlled vaccine transport containers are clearly labeled with the Rotary wheel with "End Polio Now". Typically there are official ceremonies when Rotary International presents the Pakistani health officials with a new shipment of polio vaccine and carriers to be used by government-employed vaccinators.



ROTARY'S ROLE OUTSIDE PAKISTAN

Rotary also supplies vaccine to the rest of the world. The countries of Africa and south Asia remain at particular risk for possible re-introduction of active polio and there have been memorable outbreaks in recent years, even in countries considered "polio free". This becomes possible if vaccination vigilance becomes lax because with continued births a new population of unvaccinated children will accumulate over time creating a perfect setup for a new outbreak of polio cases. As long as there is active polio virus ANYWHERE in the world, it will be necessary to continue regular polio vaccination in these countries to avoid having the virus being re-introduced and easily spread.

OUR ROLE AS ROTARIANS

Thirty years ago Rotary International embarked on a campaign to eradicate polio from the world. This task has been called the greatest humanitarian project ever undertaken by any service organization and is now 99% complete. The polio eradication campaign is now entering what we hope may become the final few years before eradication is achieved. The need for intensive vaccination efforts across the world is now even greater than ever to assure that the gains made thus far are not lost. This means that millions of dollars continue to be needed every year to keep up the vaccination rates so that polio free countries remain polio free.

Our club contributions will mean more now than ever before, not only because the need is so critical, but also through available "matching grants" each dollar contributed can ultimately result in three dollars used for polio vaccine production and related Polio Plus activities because of matching grant money from the Gates Foundation.

WHERE EACH CLUB STANDS TODAY

There are two months left before the end of our Rotary year. Please find your club's progress on the follow list. Clubs are encouraged to raise a minimum of \$50 per member each year. In past years our District usually has a few clubs raising more than \$200 per member for Polio Plus during a single year. Although some clubs have done well the clubs which are lagging are leaving our District total at less than half of our year's goal.
