Message from District Governor Dale Schultz

One of those resources was the recent District Fall Assembly on September 22, held via Zoom conferencing so our District Rotarians would be able to participate via the internet rather than traveling.

The assembly included reports and resources from our District Foundation, Membership, and Public Image chairs with their personal offers to help your clubs in whatever area you need. We heard about global projects we are a partner in, an update on the new district website, and the value of Rotary Brand Central in developing your own materials. Our membership chair provided a useful template for your club to use in new member orientation.

I believe in the **power of planning**. Your district leadership approved a District Membership Plan and I challenge each of our clubs to develop and work a Club Membership Plan as well. Our District Membership Team is ready to assist you in any way we can. We have an outline of a plan that each club can tailor to identify their unique goals. With a plan in place, we can track our efforts and measure our successes.

Here are some of the goals in the District Membership Plan that are underway.

• Issue a Membership Challenge.

An invitation has been sent to all District 5630 Rotary Club Presidents to join the 2018-2019 Membership Challenge. The challenge includes three categories of competition based on club size. The winner in each category will be determined by the percentage of member increase over the beginning of the new Rotary Year. Entries are due by September 30, 2018. • Strengthen and Expand Membership in eClub Beyond Borders

The eClub Beyond Borders is operating as a Satellite of the Kearney Dawn Rotary Club. There are currently 17 members in the eClub. Efforts are underway to charter the eClub as an independent club during this Rotary Year.

If you know of any good Rotarians who have had to lapse their membership because of work schedule conflicts or relocation, please let us hear from you. We would love to reach out to these folks and invite them to continue "doing good in the world" through membership in the District 5630 eClub.

• Develop a New Member Orientation Model

When we hold membership planning sessions, we continue to receive requests for a New Member Orientation Model. We are in the process of collecting models that are currently being used by some clubs. Our plan is to develop a generic model that clubs can use to start their orientation and mentoring of new members. If your club uses a structured orientation model, please share this with us.

Update on the Kakamega Project

Global Grant 1861258 for maternal and child health in Kakamega Kenya sponsored by the North Platte Noon Club has been very successful in reaching its goals. The \$80,000 of much needed equipment has been implemented into the Pediatric section of the Kakamega County Hospital, and the US Vocational Training Team from the Johns Hopkins and University of Nebraska Medical Centers has returned from a week of training the Kakamega physician team and community outreach personnel.



The last segment of the project was September 10-14, when the Vocational Training Team of Physicians from Kakamega County Hospital traveled to Johns Hopkins Medical Center in Baltimore, Maryland for a week of training.



The Rotary Clubs of Baltimore and Towsontowne, Maryland, hosted a reception for our team on Thursday evening to showcase the Kenya Team and the project.

Dr. Kim Baxter, Scott McLaughlin, and I attended the Thursday evening event and toured the Johns Hopkins Facility and other Baltimore sights (a five-mile walking trip, if anyone asks).

During our stay, we were saddened to learn that one of the physicians in Kakamega, who recently gave birth to twins, died of complications from the birth. This is exactly the reason this project is so important. Lives are at stake.

Our thanks to these US clubs for their commitment to making a difference in Kenya: Rotary Clubs of North Platte Noon, North Platte Sunrise, Gothenburg, Cambridge, Kearney Dawn in Nebraska and Whitefish and Kootenai in Montana.

Kakamega: A Personal Perspective

I have so many amazing memories from our recent trip to Kenya to accompany our Vocational Training Team (VTT) who traveled there to provide training for the medical personnel at Kakamega County Hospital.

I took many photos of the \$80,000 of new equipment provided through our Global Grant for the Maternity and Neonatal Departments of their hospital. I also took a lot of photos and video of the impressive hands-on training carried out by our VTT and the very engaged and passionate doctors, nurses, and other medical staff who benefitted tremendously from this training.

To see all this in motion left all of us feeling very fulfilled and confident that this \$136,000 Rotary Global Grant, initiated by our District 5630, will save the lives of many infants and their mothers. Although it is hard to single out just one memory to highlight, the following remembrance stands out as a focal point for this Grant.

Shortly before our trip, one of my son Craig's closest friends (Marcus Ploucek of Lincoln) contacted me about our Kenya project, which he knew about from our recent conversations. A few years ago, Marcus' wife Alexis started her own business in the design, production, and marketing of specialty infant and toddler clothing. Marcus told me that he and Alexis wanted to donate some of their cute little baby outfits for us to give to some of the mothers who had recently given birth there at the Kakamega County Hospital.



When we visited the delivery ward, we presented these very colorful baby outfits to four mothers, all of whom had given birth to twins (two premature infants not pictured). It

turned out that the outfits were made up in matching pairs, so they were perfectly suited for twins!

To see the looks on the faces of these new mothers receiving these beautiful little baby outfits brought everything into focus as to why we were there. Right then, these mothers knew there were others in their world, even complete strangers, who cared about them and their babies in a way they could not have expected or ever anticipated.

That is why we were there – to show our love through Rotary to strangers in another part of the world where our help is desperately needed. This was truly one of my proudest moments as a Rotarian.

POLIO PLUS FUNDRAISING

We are nearing the Second Quarter of our Rotary Year, and with the approaching month of October comes a perfect opportunity for Polio Plus fundraising!

October 2018 is Polio Awareness Month and October 24 is World Polio Day (the birthday of Jonas Salk, who developed the first polio vaccine).

In past years various clubs in District 5630 have used a variety of methods to raise public awareness. They have:



- operated information tables at local supermarkets,
- sponsored Rotary Polio Plus "infomercials" at local cinemas (see <u>EndPolio.org Resource Center</u>),
- given interviews to local newspaper and television,
- proudly worn <u>"End Polio Now" pins</u>, and
- held "Purple Pinky" events at local schools (sometimes with Interact clubs).

Our Rotarians have also sponsored fundraising activities including:

- International dinners
- Baked potato dinners
- Pitch contests
- Fun runs
- Kayak and canoe races
- Golf tournaments
- Silent auctions (often combined with some of the above)
- Raffles for various prizes
- Donation boxes at local merchants
- Food booths at local festivals

Rotary announces US \$96.5 million to end polio

"The fact that no new cases of wild poliovirus have been detected in Nigeria points to the improved surveillance and rapid response protocols Rotary and its Global Polio Eradication Initiative partners have established, particularly in insecure and inaccessible areas," said Michael K. McGovern, chair of Rotary's International PolioPlus Committee. "While this progress is promising, it's time to redouble our efforts so we can continue to maintain the political and financial support necessary to end polio for good."

Wild poliovirus is still a threat in parts of the world, with ten cases in Afghanistan and three cases in Pakistan this year so far. As long as a single child has polio, all children are at risk.

To support polio eradication efforts in countries where polio remains endemic, Rotary is allocating the majority of funds to Afghanistan (\$22.9 million), Pakistan (\$21.7 million), and Nigeria (\$16.1 million). Further funding will support efforts to keep 12 vulnerable African countries polio-free: Cameroon, Central African Republic, Chad, Democratic Republic of the Congo, Guinea, Madagascar, Mali, Niger, Sierra Leone, Somalia, South Sudan, and Sudan.

Africa will see \$5.8 million in funding for surveillance activities and \$467,800 for technical assistance. Additional funding will go to Bangladesh, Indonesia, Myanmar, and Nepal, with an additional funding surveillance in Southeast Asia. The remainder of the funding (\$6.6 million) will go to the World Health Organization (WHO) for research activities.

Rotary has committed to raising \$50 million a year to be matched 2-to-1 by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, yielding \$450 million for polio eradication activities over a three-year period. To date, Rotary has contributed more than \$1.8 billion to fight the disease, including matching funds from the Gates Foundation, and countless volunteer hours since launching its polio immunization program, Polio Plus, in 1985.

In 1988, Rotary became a core partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative with the WHO, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The Gates Foundation later joined. **Since the initiative launched**, **the incidence of polio has plummeted by more than 99.9 percent, from about 350,000 cases in 1988 to 22 confirmed in 2017**.

What must you do?

The choice is yours! All they ask is that the project improve the quality of water and/or level of awareness of it in **YOUR** community. Some examples:

- Clean up debris along a waterway, lake, creek, pond, stream, or other water source.
- Prevent erosion by planting trees and native plants along a water source.
- Encourage students to write essays on the importance of water and what *they* can do to protect it.
- Encourage farmers in your area to use eco-friendly chemicals that will not damage fragile water systems.
- If your community's water source is safe, eliminate plastic water bottles. If they are a necessity, ensure they are collected and recycled appropriately.
- Use your imagination! The bottom line is to educate your community on the importance of protecting its water sources. Get them involved!
