When the 4H camp burned down in Halsey, the RYLA team stepped up and started anew; when COVID derailed RYE, the RYE team stepped up, revamped and is off and running. With human trafficking rearing its ugly head, our rock star Human Trafficking chair hit the road, and educational efforts expanded.

All of this happened and is happening not because of me, but because of you!!! You know your communities and their needs; you have friends in far-off lands and know their needs and are taking action.

Former First Lady Rosalynn Carter once said that a leader takes people where they want to go – a great leader takes people where they don't necessarily want to go but ought to be....

As we venture into the new Rotary year, "Creating Hope in the World," don't be afraid to venture into the unknown and try something different – new projects – new meeting times – new friends - new adventures.

Rotary Action Group Against Slavery

Sunday, July 30, Is **World Day Against Trafficking**. The Rotary clubs in **Ogallala**, **McCook** and **North Platte** (**Sunrise and Noon**) will be hosting events in their communities to raise awareness on human trafficking.

Also, starting July 3, **Sound of Freedom** will hit theaters. "This movie shines a light on one of the most horrific crime industries in the world: child trafficking," states the Angel Studios website. Based on a true story, the movie stars Jim Caviezel (*The Count of Monte Cristo, The Passion of the Christ*) as Tim Ballard, a man who spent over a decade working as a special agent at the Department of Homeland Security. *Sound of Freedom* highlights one of his first missions to free dozens of children from sex trafficking and exploitation. "It is a story of the fight for freedom and hope, even in the darkest of places."

#### Nebraska/Poland Partnership Helps in Ukraine

#### District 5630 and Rotary Club Gorzow-Wielkopolski, Poland, Join Hands

In May 2022, **Paula Witt** (<u>Hastings Sunrise</u>) joined a tour group of Rotarians from Minnesota to visit Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, and Warsaw, Poland.



Paula contacted her Youth Exchange partner in Poland, Krystyna Baj-Pawluk, to determine what assistance their group of Rotarians could give to the Ukrainian refugees in crisis in Poland. In response, the 10 Rotarians in the group transported over 250 pounds of

clothing and supplies for distribution. In addition, over \$6700 was donated by Rotarians and forwarded to Baj-Pawluk. They put this project together with our financial assistance.

Rotarians in Gorzów Wielkopolski recognized the immense needs of the women and children who fled war in their country. Needs varied from shelter, food, and clothing to jobs, language, and education. But Rotarians also came to realize the severe emotional and mental health needs of these women and children, resulting from their displacement, leaving husbands and fathers to fight the war, and all the unknowns of being refugees.

The **Gorzów Wielkopolski Rotary Club** determined to provide support, counseling and special equipment to diagnose and treat depression, which was so debilitating for their refugees. Local therapists and psychologists agreed to serve and volunteer as counselors and advisors. In addition, some of the Ukrainian women themselves

volunteered to be trained and prepared to operate the equipment.



This special equipment, from Sooma Medical, is based on clinical research which applies neurostimulation for the treatment of major depressive disorders. It is only available in the EU at this time.

Each unit includes a skull cap with electrodes and saline patches. The electrodes are attached to a portable unit (about the size of a deck of cards). The patient receives a series of mild electro-stimulations over 30 minutes, over 10 to 15 sessions.

The Psychological Assistance Center for Refugees from Ukraine opened August 30, 2022. So far, over 110 women and children have experienced this therapy with the SOOMA equipment. Most patients are seeing significant improvement in their conditions, and there is an increasing demand for these services.

This is an awesome example of Rotarians joining hands with other Rotarians around the world to make a huge difference to those in need.

#### Feeding the World One Seed at a Time in Nigeria

Past District Governor (2019-20) Scott McLaughlin recently posted a summary report on Facebook of District 5630's Global Grant (GG1876785), "Improving Agricultural Economy in Nigeria," which was initiated before his service year as District Governor. He also posted a video of the ceremony in Nigeria celebrating the project and all it will accomplish.

Here is an edited version of his report and a link to a 34-minute video of the celebration and results of the project.

The grant was originally conceived as a project for Uganda, then El Salvador and finally Abuja, Nigeria.

Unfortunately, there were many difficulties, the least of which was the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic, and the project was delayed for a several years. I could not mention all the Rotarians whose dedication led to the completion of the project, but a few need to be mentioned: **Kevin Raun** and **Don Peterson** (Minden), who initiated and completed the global grant; **Fikayo Oyebiyi** (Stillwater, Okla.), who served on the Vocational Training Team; **Pietro Uzochukwu Macleo** (Past President Rotary Club of Abuja Wuse II); **Dr. Usman Ali** of Oklahoma State University; and **Jolomi Eliot**, Project Committee Member.

Pietro Uzochukwu Macleo,

Kevin's cousin, **Dr. Bill Raun**, who passed away in 2021, invented the planter and spent years of development of the hand planter with a vision of leaving the world a tool that would aid in the agricultural development of developing nations.

In addition are the many partners including District 5630 (Nebraska), District 9125 (Nigeria) and Oklahoma State University (Department of Agriculture).

**Kevin** and **Fikayo** traveled to Nigeria in April 2023 as members of a Vocational Training Team (VTT) to teach grant beneficiaries how to assemble, disassemble, clean, and maintain the planter. In addition, there was classroom training on the benefits of crop agronomics, fertilization and proper planting techniques.

All beneficiaries were trained in the field, and a test crop was planted using their new planters. They also received seed and fertilizer to plant their own crops when returning to their villages.

This **YouTube Video** shows the celebration ceremony; the 50 beneficiaries – many of them female heads of household; inside and field training sessions; plans to manufacture the planters in Africa; and some of the challenges and solutions.






