Outbound Students 2024-25

With the assistance of the North Platte Rotarians, and many Rotexes providing excellent insights, four awesome students were selected. *Zoey Dornbier* from Sidney and sponsored by the **Kimball Rotary Club** is looking forward to her year near Barcelona, Spain. *Lyssa Hoffman* from Hastings is headed south to Argentina. She is sponsored by both **Hastings Clubs.** *Haley Holzfaster* from Paxton is being sponsored by the **Ogallala Rotary Club**. She is really revved to be going to Parana State, Brazil. *Iris Robles* from Imperial is hosted by **Imperial Rotary**. She is already packing her bags ahead of her time in Romania next year.

These girls are so excited and waiting to hear about their hosting communities and host families. They are busy purchasing insurance and looking forward to applying for their visas.

Inbound Students 2023-24

The four students of the Inbound Class of 2023-2024 are learning Nebraska culture and transitioning to their final host families. They are participating in various sports (club and school teams), perfecting their English language skills, and enjoying travel opportunities with Rotarians and host families.

These students include *Juls* (Spain) living in **McCook**, *Kaeda* (Japan) in **Ogallala**, *Fabian* (Germany) in **Imperial** and, *Szymon* (Poland) in **North Platte**. They are each giving back to their communities through service to others: at least one hour each week. Please make the opportunity to get to know these folks better. You will be amazed at the lively personalities of this group of students.

Outhound Students 2023-24

Members of the 2023-2024 Outbound Class from District 5630 are experiencing amazing travels through their hosting countries. *Sienna Dutton* (McCook) is "living the life" in sunny, beautiful Spain, while *Johan Mireles* (Grant) is having an amazing time learning the language and culture in Japan.

2024-25 Exchanges

We are currently exchanging student applications with our international partners for 2024-2025 exchanges. Once we receive all the inbound applications, we will share summaries of student applications with hosting clubs. Club representatives will review the applicants and offer preferences for which students will be a "best fit" in their schools and communities. Next year we will be hosting *four* 1:1 exchanges and *three* "one-way" agreements, providing lifechanging experiences for students from Ukraine, Ecuador, and India.

This year we offered a student from Ukraine the opportunity to live in Nebraska. Due to the economic conditions resulting from the prolonged war in Ukraine, we were required to cover the expenses for this student (flight and insurance: about \$4000).

Through the amazing generosity and cooperative relationship we have with **District 5650**, (Eastern Nebraska/Western Iowa), *Bob Rauner*, District 5650 Youth Exchange Officer, was able to secure these funds from donors in the Lincoln/Omaha area to cover these expenses, if we would host the student.

Our clubs stepped up to the occasion and confirmed our willingness to take on another student this year. **YOU** are all amazing in your support of RYE Nebraska!

The Rotary Youth Exchange Program Is the Best!

I want to share some **good news** with you about what we heard from **U.S. Department of State** representatives who attended the Winter SCRYE (South Central Rotary Youth Exchange) meeting in Tulsa last month.

First of all, they reiterated the fact that they "love" our program. We are "THE Gold Standard" compared to other study abroad programs. We do it right! Consistently!

These representatives not only presented information to us, but they stayed for the entire three days to attend our sessions to learn more about the way we do things.

That is awesome!!

My Notes

- Rotary is the BEST program they work with (inbound exchange visitor programs)
- **To compare:** In a spring 2023 survey: 31% of SCRYE students responded.
 - o 98% of Rotary students reported having a positive experience.
 - o 95% had positive host family experiences.
 - o 100% reported having regular contact with their local coordinators/counselors.
 - o 11% reported mental health issues that affected their exchanges..
- **Other programs:** 16% response rate to the survey.
 - o 21% needed a change in host family placements because of problems.
 - o 26% reported having mental health problems affecting their exchanges.
 - o 16% reported having *no* contact with their local coordinators.

I can tell you from my own recent experiences with other sponsoring organizations: WE DO THINGS RIGHT! and I certainly recognize what "minimum competency" looks like!

KUDOS to each of you in your communities.

KUDOS to each of your Rotary Clubs, communities and schools for embracing RYE students and making them feel so positive about our Program.

Lessons Learned

- We are the BEST program because frontline **volunteers** (YOU!) DO IT RIGHT! YOU CARE! You pay attention and you respond so well when things need attention.
- We need to get the word out to the schools and students about ROTARY YOUTH EXCHANGE.
 Many of our schools accept students from other programs, and these students have never even heard about Rotary! Once they do, they know they paid too much and received so little!
- Talk it up! Share the good news! Be proud of our reputation and accomplishments!

Thank you for making Rotary Youth Exchange such a great program for our young people! Youth Exchange is the FUTURE of Rotary!

Remembering Dwight E. Smith

December 31, 1944 - March 17, 2024

The Chappell Rotary Club has had to say goodbye to their friend Dwight Smith, who had been a part of their club since 1973. The club remembers him for "that big smile he always brought to our meetings and his great sense of humor. He was a great friend to all that knew him and will missed dearly." He practiced law in Chappell for 20 years before retiring to farm fulltime. He and his wife of 55 years, Vickie, moved to Plattsmouth in August of 2023.

Making Rotary Simply Irresistible

Since the 2024 Rotary International Assembly in early January, participants at Rotary's annual learning event for incoming leaders have been talking a lot about making our Rotary clubs "simply irresistible." This term was used as the title of a 1988 song and a 1999 movie. In terms of Rotary, it was first used by Past District Governor *Louisa Horne* (District 7815) and recently championed by *Stephanie Urchick*, 2024-25 Rotary International president.

So what does "simply irresistible" mean in terms of an organization? According to Deloitte's description of "The Simply Irresistible Organization," an irresistible organization has five elements.

- ◆ Meaningful Work. No one joins a club to do nothing. Our members join for various reasons, but they all join to do something meaningful. This is true whether it be a traditional or virtual club and whether it focuses on local and/or international projects. We need to give our members purposeful opportunities, and we should change up these opportunities somewhat regularly so our members don't get bored doing the same thing. How do you know which opportunites to provide? Give your members what they want by conducting a member satisfaction survey.
- ◆ **Supportive Management.** The Rotary International Board of Directors recently implemented three-year goals for its various paired zones. Goal setting and accountability are also happening at the district and club levels. Rotary also invests in its leaders through various learning opportunities. Our Zone Coordinators receive these opportunities at the Support/Global Global Philanthropy District Governors-Elect receive them at the International Assembly. Club Presidents-Elect receive them at Presidents-Elect Training Members receive them at district seminars and in Rotary's **Learning Center**.
- ◆ Positive Work Environment. Our organization's Vision Statement starts with the words "Together, we." Most people want to serve, but they want to serve with likeminded people with the same values. Of course, we have to ensure our members feel that they belong and that their opinions matter to other club members and leadership. Again, surveys would help here. If you implement some of the suggestions your surveys generate, people will feel that they're being heard. Rotary International does a

- good job of <u>recognizing its members</u> and other participants with awards of many types. But recognition also needs to happen at the club level. This recognition should not only be for financial giving, but also for things such as being a new member sponsor.
- ◆ **Growth Opportunities.** Our members want to be part of something that allows them to grow. Rotary's Vision Statement reads: "Together, we see a world where people unite and take action to create lasting change across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves." These last three words are important. People want to be part of something that fosters self-improvement. Working with others to serve makes this happen, and studies show that the act of serving others makes us happy. Why? Because when we focus on others, we aren't thinking about ourselves. To quote Louisa Horne: "It's not about me, it's about M.E. the Membership Experience."
- ◆ Trust in Leadership. I've spent the last decade getting to know our organization's leaders from the club level (serving on the Presidents-elect Training Seminar Alliance) up to our International Presidents' level (through serving as a president's aide, learning facilitator, and president's representative). These roles have taught me that our Rotary leaders are purpose-driven and inspiring not only through their words, but also (and more importantly) through their actions. If we continue to have strong leaders, we will have strong clubs and a strong Rotary.

If we focus on helping our clubs improve these five areas, Rotary will become "simply irresistible"!

Rotary Action Group Against Slavery

Those of you who attended PETS conference in Westminster March 1-3 heard me speak briefly about Bark Technologies, but I wanted to elaborate and to share the information with those of you not in attendance.

Bark has released a cool new piece of technology to aid us parents in our quest to keep our kids safe. I don't know about you all, but I could use all the help I can get in this crazy, ever-changing world.

I have been using the Bark App on both of my daughters' devices since 2021 to monitor texts, social media activity, track their location, block websites and apps, and manage their screen time. You just download the app on your home computer or your personal phone and then download the Bark app on your kids' devices.

With the push of a button, I can request a check-in from them and am alerted when they leave one location and arrive at another. My favorite feature is the alert I get any time one of my girls watches anything related to alcohol/drugs, bullying, self-harm, sexual content, or violence, just to name a few. Included with the alert is the exact video or content they watched so I am able to view exactly what they saw. You will also have access to fun quizzes, informational videos, and blog posts addressing topics such as the 12 most dangerous apps for kids and signs of teenage depression and how to address them.

Last year Bark introduced its newest product, the Bark Phone. It was recognized as a safer smartphone in *Time* magazine's Best Inventions of 2023 list and has been featured on the *Today Show*, *Good Morning America*, *CNN*,

in *Forbes* magazine and has received shoutouts from many celebrities, including Drew Barrymore.

Bark's software is built directly into the phone, so it automatically monitors texts, emails, social media, and apps. The app can't be deleted from the Bark Phone, which helps ensure the settings you put in place will stay.

The Bark Phone looks and functions like any other smartphone. As your child matures, the features can be customized to your liking.

Plans start at \$39/month and include unlimited talk and text with no contract required. The Starter plan, meant for younger children and teens, allows only texting and calling, but on the advanced plans, your child can request approval to download games and apps.

You can't turn on the news anymore without hearing stories of mass shootings, murders, kidnappings and human trafficking. The Bark app and phone are just a couple of ways we can ensure our children's safety in this digital world we live in. For more information, please visit https://www.bark.us/.

Special Message from Mike Hilgers, Nebraska Attorney General

In an increasingly digital age, human trafficking victims and children are often also exploited online in addition to other crimes. The Nebraska Human Trafficking Task Force (NHTTF) is committed to protecting survivors from revictimization online.

Since the beginning of the Nebraska Human Trafficking Task Force, many laws have been passed to further protect victims and hold perpetrators accountable. However, no laws have yet been passed in Nebraska that hold online content providers responsible for distributing nonconsensual content of sex trafficking victims and children.

This year, the Legislature is considering a new law, LB 1096, that would protect children and sex trafficking victims from online exploitation. LB 1096 would hold internet content providers responsible if they distribute sexual content of human trafficking victims or minors online. This bill would label that activity as a deceptive trade practice in our state statutes and subject companies that exploit victims online to fines.

These regulations would apply to any company, even those outside Nebraska, that distributes nonconsensual content of abuse victims.

The goal of this bill is to reduce the demand for sex trafficking by removing an avenue for traffickers and content providers to make money by exploiting victims online.



Time for Good News about Polio

Time for good news! At the end of February 2024, we are still at ZERO cases of wild poliovirus-caused paralysis for this calendar year. The last case was 18 weeks ago!!

While no new wild poliovirus or cVDPV (variant) cases have YET been reported, three positive environmental samples for wild poliovirus were collected in 2024 — all from Pakistan.



We are making progress, but there is still work to be done. Now is the time to prepare for World Immunization Week the last week in April and for World Polio Day, 24 October 2024.

World Immunization Week is April 24-30, 2024. This is an ideal opportunity

for promoting polio vaccines and donations to End Polio. After all, the success of the polio vaccine is proof that vaccines do work (as do several other vaccines, by the way). Campaign materials are available now at www.endpolio.org

Polio eradication has been Rotary's primary goal for more than 30 years, so it's important to show your support for our number one initiative.

We want to show the world that Rotary members still care about polio eradication and the promise we made long ago to the children of the world. Whether you host an event or a fundraiser, raise awareness of the importance of polio immunization on social media, or make a simple presentation during a meeting, it's essential to show that we're making a difference. What matters is raising awareness for a cause important to all Rotary members and friends of our organization.

Need a Boost? A Companion Club Could Be the Answer.

The Broken Bow Area Rotary Club just added a "Companion Club" – 13 new Rotarians from nearby Ainsley, Nebraska. A Companion Club has also been called a "Satellite Club," but *IPDG Deb McCaslin*, membership chair of the Broken Bow Club, prefers the name "Companion" because it emphasizes that the two clubs work alongside each other. The Broken Bow Club is there to support Ainsley's projects, and the Ainsley members are ready to be engaged in Broken Bow Area's service efforts.

Here's a brief summary of the characteristics and advantages of Companion Clubs, adapted from an online article from **Rotary District 6420**.

What's the Purpose?

The primary focus of a Service Companion Club is community service. This model offers an alternative membership route for individuals who cannot attend regular Rotary meetings. By doing away with standard meeting obligations, the Service Companion Club adopts an inclusive approach to impacting communities positively.

How Do They Operate?

The club members meet to plan and execute service projects, either in person or via platforms like Zoom, Microsoft Teams, or WhatsApp. While optional, members can also attend meetings of their Host Club. Despite its separate operational structure, the Service Companion Club is considered a Rotary International Satellite Club of the Host Club, and members pay a nominal annual fee of \$200, covering international and district dues as well as basic expenses.

How Is It Organized?

Board of Directors: Decision-making within the Service Companion Club lies with its Board of Directors, which operates independently but often includes representation from the Host Club. The club can either adopt its Host Club's bylaws with modifications or create its own.

Committees for Service Projects, Membership, Club Administration, Public Image, and The Rotary Foundation are encouraged.

Secretary and Treasurer: These roles manage administrative tasks and financial aspects, ensuring smooth coordination with the Host Club.

Service Projects

The Service Companion Club has autonomy in designing its service projects, but it also supports initiatives hosted by its Host Club and other Rotary Clubs. In essence, it acts as a force multiplier for service in the community.

Are Members Considered Rotarians?

Yes, members are considered part of the Host Club, even having "Active" status as Satellite Club members on MyRotary.org. They are listed in and have access to the DACdb club management system, just like their counterparts in the Host Club.

The Bottom Line

With a Service Companion Club, you are one club meeting at two different times, increasing membership diversity and providing more opportunities for community service. Whether your members are young professionals, working mothers, or those with changing work responsibilities, this model offers a flexible pathway to service.





But what about other important club officers, like the secretary who keeps track of members and updates your records, and the treasurer who makes sure all the dues are collected and bills are paid?

Is there training available for them? With the everimproving and ever-expanding Learning Center provided by Rotary International, the answer is Yes!

Secretary Training

First, make sure you've set up your <u>My Rotary</u> account. Then see the "<u>Club Secretary Basics</u>" Learning Plan at the Learning Center. It's a 4-hour course in all, broken up into

nine 15- and 30-minute sessions with titles such as Managing Club Business, Working with Your Club Leadership Team, Rotary Club Central Resources, and Protecting Personal Data.

If you've been club secretary for a while, use the course to update your knowledge – and remind you of all the ways you can serve your club.

For Treasurers

The <u>"Club Treasurer Basics"</u> is a 2.75 hour course made up of 7 15- and 30-minute sessions. Session titles include Get Ready: Club Treasurer – covering how to pay club invoices and adhering to proper financial standards. Other topics cover Minimizing Risk and how to use Rotary's Action Plan.

If members in your club, district, or zone want to learn more about the Learning Center, they can write to learn@rotarv.org to schedule a virtual presentation.
