Dena Beck has been involved in community development since returning to Custer County after her graduation from Kansas State University in 2000. Her position with the Minden Chamber of Commerce "opened my eyes to what actually powers a community—

We made a conscious effort then to 1) try to get them out into different areas and countries to experience the richness of the world and all the people in it and 2) to bring *in* culture whenever possible.

It was a natural fit for joining Rotary: hosting students from around the globe, and having an opportunity to take advantage of the Rotary Youth Exchange program with our oldest daughter.

For many years, I had admired Rotary from a distance. Then we became involved as a host family, then parents of a RYE student, assisting with outbound interviews, and presenting to the group on various topics. Once I became an empty-nester, it was time to join. The transition was smooth, thanks to a welcoming group of people in my hometown and the district.

Rotary has helped me and my family in many ways.

Inbound exchange students have enjoyed their opportunities to get together this fall. Joined by D-5650, eight exchangers spent an awesome weekend (October



25-26) at the Ogallala Haunt. The Haunt is an annual fundraiser for Polio Plus, coordinated by *Jim* and *Teresa Delahunty* from the **Ogallala Rotary Club**. On Friday night, students were treated to shrieks and scares



as they went through the event. On Saturday evening, they became the characters who sent shivers through the crowd who attended. We were also hosted in an awesome lakeside B&B at Lake McConaughy. Thank you, *Lorena Beckius*, for arranging



this! This year the Haunt raised \$6145. Kudos! to the Ogallala Club for their efforts and successes!

Just a couple weeks later, November 9-10, student applicants and their parents were invited to North Platte for our annual District Interviews weekend, hosted by the North Platte Noon Rotarians. (Thank you, Kendy McClain

and committee, for the potato bar.) Following all the information, questions and answers, bowling and overnight fellowship, we determined to offer *Mac Whitehead* (McCook) and *Owen Phelps* (Hastings) 2025-2026 exchange scholarships. *Christdolyn Hagan* (Elwood) was offered an exchange for 2026-2027. They all excitedly accepted.

As a sidenote, the interview weekend has evolved into a leadership training opportunity for inbound exchangers and Rotexes. These young adults were added to the interview teams who gather and share their observations regarding the applicants. They offer a unique but essential perspective on the applicants, from a peer perspective. They were active participants in the discussions and recommendations for the weekend. In response, students were glad to be included and felt esteemed by the additional responsibilities.

Accepted applicants Mac and Owen are now attending Rotary meetings, preparing their international applications, scheduling their health, dental and vision appointments, and writing letters to their potential host families. In the meantime, *Paula Witt* is connecting with international partner districts and preparing exchange agreements for 2025-2026.

November and December bring more changes for the inbound students as they transition to new host families and submit their security deposits for the USA tour scheduled for June 15 to July 13, 2025. Rotarians are demonstrating their amazing generosity and commitment to RYE by supporting their students in their plans.

January is the time we will seek Rotary club commitments for hosting in 2025-26. Several clubs have expressed an interest in becoming involved again in RYE. We are looking for six to eight host clubs for inbound students next year. Contact *Paula Witt* if you have questions or want a presentation for your club meeting.

Other January activities include our annual Winter SCRYE meeting in Tulsa, Okla., January 24-26. This is a weekend of continuing education for RYE committee and upcoming District Governors, while students participate in community service and fellowship with 80 to 100 inbound students from other districts.

My Rotary "Why?"

My answer is simple. It's because of Rotary Youth Exchange!

When we were young parents with four children in the house, our oldest son *Scott*, then a senior at Hastings High School, told us he

wanted to be an exchange student. We were initially concerned because we were not upper class, and he was not a star citizen or even a remarkable student, so why would he be selected? However, he went through the application and interview process (a much, much simpler process than today), and after a couple phone calls from our local Youth Exchange Officers, Drs. *Ed Lockwood* and *Jerry Seiler*, he was selected to go to Sweden. My husband, *Dick*, a young lawyer, felt if his son was a Rotary Exchange Student, he should become a Rotarian. This was 1993.

Of course, I reasoned, if we're sending our son halfway around the world, we were going to visit him! (It was my first international trip at 40 years old!) This is when I witnessed the *Magic of Rotary!* We met Scott's host families and realized how much he was welcomed, cared for, loved and nurtured by them. We got a glimpse of the life he lived for a year and what motivated him to modify his life trajectory.

He experienced opportunities such a class trip to St. Petersburg, Russia, invitations to attend the Nobel Awards, and 1994 Winter Olympics in Oslo, Norway, and a trip to the Arctic Circle to view the midnight sun. While in Stockholm, he was recruited by Nebraska Wesleyan University and offered scholarships to attend.

At Nebraska Wesleyan, he developed strengths he didn't know he had. He became a quite respectable student and leader and was elected President of the Student Body his senior year. Following graduation, he was offered a business/marketing internship in New York City with a Fortune 500 company. As part of his east coast employment, he frequently travelled internationally, representing clients such as Coca-Cola and Loreal, among many others. While in New York City, he met his future wife, Anita, who is a first-generation immigrant from India. He, and we, learned a new culture and customs, and broadened our Nebraska-rooted worldviews.

Fast-forward twelve years (2005-2006), our youngest son *Matt* determined international travel was in his future, too. By this time, Dick was involved with *Ronna Morse* and the District RYE committee, and I tailed along. Matt spent his year in Izmir, Turkey, and I joined Rotary. And travelled.

Matt's year in Turkey was uniquely different from his brother's exchange. While he experienced an earthquake, and lots of exploration and travel in Turkey, he never learned the language and didn't develop fond bonds with his host family. But he did contract the "travel bug." Following college, he and his wife, Hope, both teachers, travelled the world during all the school breaks and eventually accepted teaching positions at the International School of the Nations, in Macau, China. They made deep friendships with their students and families and other teachers from around the world, during their three years there.



Matt returned to the U.S. in late 2017 to receive treatment at Mayo Clinic for an aggressive cancer. Matt's life had an enormous impact on his students and co-workers. Over 150 individuals around the world viewed a live Zoom memorial tribute to him in late 2020. https://youtu.be/UoNuviLHbiY

Of note, *Scott Witt* will be the keynote speaker at the 2025 winter SCRYE meeting in Tulsa, Okla., in January. He will be sharing some of the ways his life changed in response to his year of Rotary International Youth Exchange. Scott and Anita currently live in Menlo Park, Calif., with their three children. And I visit them as often as I can!

Rotary changes lives! And the ripple effect just continues.

And that's why I am a Rotarian.
