rotary youth exchange

S tarting at home in Nebraska: The hosted students (9) and outbound students (5) and their parents, plus Rotarians and Rotexes are gathering in Hastings February 28 and March 1 for Outbound Orientation. Hastings Sunrise Rotarians are supporting the event by home hosting students and adults overnight and assisting with meals for the group over the weekend. Students will be doing community service projects at Crane Meadows near Wood River and in Hastings.

On the road to Tulsa: Our students and RYE committee members traveled to the annual South Central Rotary Youth Exchange (SCRYE) winter conference in Tulsa, Okla. This multi-district SCRYE organization provided our continuing education and an opportunity for 115 students to gather and socialize for the weekend. It was a long ride, but a great bonding and sharing time. District Youth Protection Officer *Jim Delahunty* of Ogallala attended several sessions about his role and responsibilities. Be prepared to hear more from him in the coming months. *Dick and Paula Witt* had a few proud moments when their son, *Scott Witt* (RYE to Sweden, 1993-94) was the keynote speaker at the conference. He received many accolades (and invitations to join Rotary) following his presentation.

Back in Nebraska: Districts 5630 and 5650 RYE leaders are finding more ways to work together and share resources.

- 1. After gathering students from Ogallala to Lincoln, 12 students plus Rotarians shared a 15-passenger van for the trip to Oklahoma.
- 2. We received an application for exchange from a student living in Summerland, which lies in District

- 3. *Paula* was contacted by the Sandy Creek High School principal who asked us to place two international students at their school next year (2025-2026). Located in Fairfield in district 5650, this presents another opportunity for our two districts to make Rotary Magic happen!
- 4. Finally, Outbound Orientation at the end of this month continues to be a joint effort to educate outbound students and their families in preparation for their exchanges. This year three students will be headed to Japan, one to Brazil and another TBA (South America).

And back to RYE being all over the map: Longstanding RYE Committee members, *Lisa Jorgenson* (Gothenburg), *Todd Madison* (Valentine) and *Paula Witt* (Hastings) will be heading to Mérida, Yucatan, Mexico for an international gathering of YEOs. This is perfect timing as we can meet personally with our exchange partners, make exchange agreements, and accept international students into our communities and schools.

anuary was National Human Trafficking Awareness Month, with January 11 designated as National Human Trafficking Awareness Day. The Department of

Homeland Security hosts a <u>Blue Campaign</u> each year which "is a national public awareness campaign designed to educate the public, law enforcement, and other industry partners to recognize the indicators of human trafficking, and how to appropriately respond to possible cases" as mentioned on the DHS website. They ask the public to show their support in the fight to end human trafficking by wearing blue on January 11. *Thank you to those who sent in a picture of themselves wearing blue!*



Last month on January 11, the Nebraska Attorney General *Mike Hilgers* and *Colonel John Bolduc* along with members from state and local law enforcement, senators, child advocacy centers and many non-profit workers gathered at the state Capitol to watch Nebraska governor *Jim Pillen* read and sign a proclamation designating January National Human Trafficking Awareness Month in Nebraska. Each year during this press conference *Mike Hilgers* releases/shares the previous year's Nebraska Human Trafficking Task Force report. In this report you will find new bills and legislation, up-to-date statistics, breakdown of human trafficking cases, upcoming events and many other resources for our state. I have linked the 2024 report here: <u>Human Trafficking Task Force Report</u>.



The Task Force has also rolled out a new poster displaying the Nebraska Human Trafficking Hotline number: **833-757-5665 (833-PLS-LOOK)**. I don't know about you, but when I am anxious or in stressful situations, I have trouble recalling information, so I encourage everyone to make note of the number by storing it in your phone. That way if you ever see something suspicious and would like to report it you won't have to waste precious time looking up the number. Even if you are unsure about what you are seeing, please make a call. Every law enforcement officer I have ever talked to stated they would rather be called to a false alarm than have a potential trafficker get away and the victim not be rescued.

My club's January project was distributing these posters throughout McCook and surrounding communities. We hung them

on public bulletin boards, in restaurants, convenient stores, and public bathrooms. The posters are free to the public, so if you would like some to distribute in your own community, please let me know.

The last week of January, which was Human Trafficking Prevention Month, Gothenburg Rotarians spread awareness of human trafficking through the Red Sand Project.

More than 51,000 reports of human trafficking are reported every year in the U.S. via phone calls, texts, webchats, emails or online tips to the National Human Trafficking Hotline. Human trafficking is the fastest growing criminal enterprise and it impacts every community in the world.

Did you know...

- There are an estimated 50 million victims of human trafficking worldwide including about 4 million in the U.S. whether in forced marriages, forced labor or for sexual exploitation.
- In the U.S., 75% of trafficked victims are exploited for sex, 25% are trafficked for labor.
- Children are particularly vulnerable. Nearly half of all human trafficking victims are younger than 18.
- Victims come from all demographics, all communities.

The millions of grains of red sand poured represent the millions of victims of human trafficking who have fallen through the cracks. If you see something suspicious, say something. You just might save a life. Learn more at <u>redsandproject.org</u>.




The **Hastings Noon** and **Hastings Sunrise** clubs came together on February 11 to pack 19,440 meals at Hearts and Hands Against Hunger.
